In a world with mounting crises like climate change and gun violence, PDF understands the importance our youth play in making our global society more just and equitable. Change will not happen without youth taking matters into their own hands, thankfully, we know that they are. At PDF, we support the collective fight for a better future and work to contribute to the success of young activists.

The collective importance of youth organizing is indisputable. In recent years, examples like the Black Lives Matter Movement and the immense increase in young voter turnout, make clear that young people now-more than ever-are educating themselves on social issues and are taking matters into their own hands.

The Braiding New Worlds Fund's committee members are young people aged 18 to 25 years old. Each brings an important perspective and knowledge of youth activism and organizing to the

Braiding New Worlds Fund grantee Tucson Youth and Peace (TYP) centers themselves on a shared mission to create safe and diverse community dialogue to protect equitable educational progress and dismantle systemic racism. TYP hosts a yearlong peace leadership program for children and young adults between the ages of 12 and 24 in which uniquely themed free monthly workshops are organized

to educate and promote leadership. Individuals in this program are prepared to attend the Tucson Annual Youth and Peace Conference, an event that empowers youth to become courageous and creative leaders and peacemakers.

Tucson Youth and Peace shared that with the Braiding New Worlds Fund grant "we are able to pay youth for their sacred time and energy! This empowers youth to no end!" TYP focuses on social issues including gender-based violence, racial injustice, public education, etc. The workshops aim to educate and raise awareness in the community about BIPOC, LGBTQ+ folx, and more.

PDF's funding niche is in supporting grassroots organizing and capacity-building initiatives that shift power dynamics and create systemic change. While supporting direct services is critical in this time of great need, we must also double down on our efforts to uplift those confronting structural inequities. We invest in local

leaders, especially young people, because we know they are building a more just and equitable future that our communities need to survive and thrive.

The current generation of youth has promoted the importance of awareness to national issues and has made strides to disprove the age-old expectation of being voung and naïve.

Given the current state of the government and the deep-rooted, systemic issues that Americans face, our nation's youth is confronted with a tough choice: to be in denial or to take action.

Last year in celebration of PDF's 40th anniversary, PDF established the youth-focused Braiding New Worlds Fund. Grants ranging from \$3,000 to \$6,500 were given to seven youth-led and youth-oriented organizations around the country.

Braiding New Worlds Fund grantee, Queer Youth Assemble (QYA), is a youth-led non-profit organization dedicated to the success and wellbeing of queer youth across the United States and territories. QYA founders started Let Trans Athletes Play (LTAP), a program that hosts sporting events, games and other child-friendly activities for the public with the goal of opposing anti-trans bills circulating around the country, and creating solidarity. The first LTAP drew approximately 100 attendees and received coverage in The Boston Globe.

QYA co-founder Esmeé Silverman proclaims that, "[being selected] has given us a breath

Self-Managed Abortion; Safe and Supported in the US

PDF's 40th anniversary culminated in an event at the Amherst office last June with guest speaker Susan Yanow, cofounder of Women Help Women and longtime reproductive rights activist. Attendees heard her thoughts on the Roe v. Wade decision, its impact, and what's next for activists.

Self-Managed Abortion; Safe and Supported in the US (SASS), fiscally sponsored by PDF, is a US project of Women Help Women, a global nonprofit organization that supports the rights of people around the world to have information about and access to safe abortion with medication.

In the US, abortion is not legal in every state, and access is dwindling. With a hostile environment in Washington and the recent overturning of Roe v. Wade, access to abortion for those who are young, low-income and/or part of a disenfranchised group, has become impossible in many states. According to FIGO, the International Federation of Gynecology and Obstetrics, "lack of access to safe abortion care is one of the leading causes of preventable maternal death and disability. Each year, 47,000 women in the world die as a result of unsafe abortion and an estimated 5 million are hospitalized for the treatment of serious complications such as bleeding or infection."

SASS aids in the access to reproductive autonomy, health and safety through providing one-on-one support and information to people in the US who choose to use abortion pills on their own, through secure online communications with trained counselors overseas. Since the Supreme Court struck down the constitutional right to end a pregnancy, demand for abortion pills has soared. In some states, using those pills or helping others could be grounds for prosecution. The SASS website provides critical information about medication, clinics, and practical support options (accommodation, travel support) for those seeking a clinic-based abortion.

SASS is more important than ever in providing safe, fact-based information to those who may not otherwise have access to it. ◆

Holyoke's Puerto Rican cultural district. In her time there she notably fundraised for signature events and projects, hosted walking tours of the city's artwork, collaborated with other community organizations and aided in weekly food distribution.



Sonya Epstein (they/ them) is a community organizer who has been deeply involved with student activism around restorative justice, free public higher education, and LGBTQ liberation for many years. They

are an immigrant from Belarus and studied Social Thought & Political Economy and Sociology at UMass Amherst.

Preparing For Our Next Forty Years

Last year we celebrated the 40th Anniversary of Peace Development Fund, founded in 1981.

Since then, we have granted more than \$56.8 million to nearly 2,100 organizations. Many organizations that started out small have gone on to make huge impacts in the movement for peace and justice. Over the years, we launched dozens of special initiatives leading to new collaborations on critical issues. Additionally, we have provided capacity-building trainings for more than 1,000 groups and 3,500 people around the country. We commemorated our anniversary through several reflections and new projects over the course of the year. These included a retrospective video, five Peace Talks, a Celebration of Women's Leadership at our Peace and Justice Center in Amherst, and the creation of a new grant program, Braiding New Worlds Fund.

As we move into our next 40 years, we know that PDF will continue to play an important role in advancing peace and justice in the US. As the times have changed, so has PDF. Because we focus on funding organizing led by people in the community and small organizations, we can be nimble about what issues we fund. As mentioned above, the new Braiding New Worlds Fund is providing funding for the youth organizing movement around today's issues like climate change, transgender rights, and gun violence. We look forward to 40 more years and finding new ways to bend the arc towards justice—and to working with you to make that happen!

Honoring Jamie Babson

James "Jamie" Babson (1954–2022) was a gracious and generous man and a longtime supporter of PDF's vision. Jamie was regarded as humorous, lively and immensely big-hearted. Over the years, Jamie was an avid world traveler, with an affinity for both Sri Lanka



and India, and an energetic philanthropist. He was a founding member of the Threshold Foundation and an integral member of Green America and the Investor's Circle. He served on the boards of the Massachusetts Peace Action and the Veterans Education Project and was deeply involved in peace activism and investment research, and a dedicated funder of Indigenous organizations.

Jamie first began his relationship with PDF in November of 1990, and continued to support PDF for almost three full decades. He generously donated gifts through stock sales as well as holding a donor advised fund with PDF. PDF extends our deepest condolences to the Babson family and friends of Jamie.
